What to Do

- Pronouns take the place of nouns. Like nouns, pronouns can be singular or plural, and they can be subjects or objects in a sentence.
- Pronouns can also begin interrogative sentences and adjective clauses, and they can show possession. The chart shows some of the different kinds of pronouns.

Kinds of Pronouns	Examples
Personal	I, me, we, you, he, she, it, him, her, they, them
Possessive	mine, ours, yours, his, hers, its, theirs
Interrogative	who, which, whom, whose
Relative	who, which, what, that, whom, whose
Indefinite	any, all, each, both, either, neither, few, nothing, many, one, several, anyone, everyone, some, no one, someone, none, other, others, such, somebody, something, anybody, anything, everything
